My Two Shekels

Another school year has come to a close, and I'm sure that we are all looking forward to moving at a little slower pace during the summer. I know that I am! Our last major festival, Shavuot, has also come and gone, and the next big holiday that we all have to look forward to is Rosh HaShanah!

But the month of June still awaits, and it's an important one in our national and Jewish calendar. June is Pride Month, which honors and celebrates the LGBT community, their struggles to achieve equality and inclusivity, and the successes that have resulted.

It all started in New York City, in the summer of 1969. A police raid at the Stonewall Inn in Greenwich Village, a popular haunt for the LGBT community, quickly grew out of hand and ended in a riot that continued over the course of the next several days. It was the catalyst for the creation of advocacy groups that would fight to combat fear and secure equal rights for this marginalized community, who were so often the victims of discrimination and violence.

A year later, in June of 1970, the first gay marches took place in New York, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Chicago. Today, marches and other Gay Pride awareness events have been established worldwide. Every year in Dallas, I celebrate Pride at an interfaith service at Congregation Beth El Binah in Dallas, and it's moving to see the diverse faith congregations that attend.

So why, as Jews, should we care about Gay Pride? Because, as writer David Levy suggests, "The values of *achdut*, of Jewish unity, and *areivut*, communal responsibility, are woven throughout our texts and traditions. The Talmudic dictum *Kol yisrael arevim zeh bazeh* – all Israel is bound up in one another – emphasizes that and when individuals in our community are hurting, it is up to all of us to make things right."

Throughout our liturgy, we are told that we are all made "B'Tzelem Elohim," – in God's image. And that image is reflected in all of humanity, in all races, religions, gender identities and sexual orientations. And when we witness injustice which threatens the dignity and well-being of any individual or group of people, we are commanded to step in and speak out.

Although progress has been made, blatant discrimination against the LGBT community in many areas of life, including work, school, housing and healthcare, continues. I'll have much more to say about that on June 30, when I officiate at my last official Shabbat service for the summer. I invite each of you to come and celebrate CBS Pride Shabbat and learn more about what we, as a Jewish community, can do to help.

That day is also Richard and my 34th wedding anniversary, so you can bet there will be oatmeal chocolate chip cookies!

Speaking of Pride, I am very proud of CBS, as we are now included in the Jewish advocacy group Keshet's equality guide, which offers a list of synagogues across the country providing safe and sup-

The Ritual Life

There are two fast days on the calendar in July; July 1st (which corresponds to 17 Tammuz) and the 22nd (which corresponds to the 10th of Av). Standing out like bookends, they represent two of the saddest days in Jewish history.

This three-week morning period marks the breaching of Jerusalem's walls, leading up to the destruction of both Holy Temples. The first is a minor fast day, beginning at sunup and ending at sundown, while the 2nd is a full 26 hours fast, just as on Yom Kippur.

From where do we trace the origins of these two tragic events? Moshe Rabbienu broke the 1st set of tablets on 17 Tammuz. Just as the tablets shattered, so did the walls of Jerusalem; leaving us terrified, vulnerable and exposed.

This culminated with the report of 10 of the 12 spies who returned from their 40-day journey through Canaan with a negative report, causing Klal Israel to lose their faith in HaShem and left sobbing overnight in their tents. According to the Midrash, G-d vowed that since they cried in vain, the 10th of Av would become a day in which many terrible tragedies would befall the Jewish people, giving them real reasons for their tears.

HaShem however, in his infinite wisdom, compassion for and love of the Jewish people, gave us hope with the promise of Moshiach and the building of the 3rd Bet HaMikdash (Temple).

This is illustrated in the following event, recorded in the Talmud, Makkot 24B-

Again, it happened that Rabban Gamliel, Rabbi Elazar ben Azaria, Rabbi Joshua and Rabbi Akiva went up to Jerusa-

lem. When they reached Mt. Scopus, they tore their garments. When they reached the Temple Mount, they saw a fox emerging from the place of the Holy of Holies. The others started weeping; Rabbi Akiva laughed.

They said to him: "Why are you laughing?" Said he to them: "Why are you weeping?" Said they to him: "A place (so holy) that it is said of it, 'the stranger that approaches it shall die', and now foxes traverse it, and we shouldn't weep?" Said he to them: "That is why I laugh. For it is written, 'I shall have bear witness for Me faithful witnesses—Uriah the Priest and Zechariah.'"

Now, what is the connection between Uriah and Zachariah? Uriah was in the time of the First Temple, and Zachariah was (in the time of) the Second Temple! But the Torah makes Zachariah's prophecy dependent upon Uriah's prophecy. With Uriah, it is written: 'Therefore, because of you, Zion shall be plowed as a field; Jerusalem shall become heaps, and the Temple Mount like the high places of a forest'.

With Zachariah it is written, 'Old men and women shall yet sit in the streets of Jerusalem.' "As long as Uriah's prophecy had not been fulfilled, I feared that Zechariah's prophecy may not be fulfilled either. But now that Uriah's prophecy has been fulfilled, it is certain that Zechariah's prophecy will be fulfilled."

With these words they replied to him: "Akiva, you have consoled us! Akiva, you have consoled us!"

Adult Education

The 2017-2018 school year of Adult Education events closed with a class given on May 12, by **Keith Pelusi**. This event was very well attended - first, because congregants from Saturday Sabbath service could stay for the class, and second, some of our youth added to the count, as the topic was of high interest and importance to them. The following paragraphs from **Ken Licker** and **Ellen Pincus**, respectively, are of their insights from the class:

"A new format for an educational class was tried on Saturday, May 12. Keith Pelusi led a discussion following our regular Shabbat service on the topic of the Christian church and how to deal with proselytizing. He discussed the history of Christianity as a basis for understanding the reason that Christians proselytize. Keith followed this with the potential arguments that one might be met with and how to counter them. The presentation was well received, and the format of a Saturday discussion following services gives the Education committee another opportunity to serve more of our congregants."

"Keith Pelusi delivered an extremely informative talk about Christian proselytizing, helping our older children and adult congregants to understand what it is, why it occurs, and how we can best respond to it. Arming us with fact, Keith helped us to understand the origin of Christianity and the tenets which set Judaism apart. He evoked lively participation and the respect of an appreciative audience."

Looking toward the 2018-2019 school year, **Adult Education is thrilled to welcome back Rabbi Bentzi Epstein on Sunday, October 14**. In November we hope to have Barry Schneider speak about Jews in the Military, and also in the fall, a follow-up class by Keith Pelusi. Speakers from outside our congregation are in the plans for winter and spring classes
